






BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Soil: The Story of a Black Mother's Garden Poet and scholar
Camille T. Dungy recounts
the seven-year odyssey
to diversify her garden in
the predominately white community of
Fort Collins, Colorado. When she moved
there in 2013, with her husband and
daughter, the community held strict
restrictions about what residents could
and could not plant in their gardens.

In resistance to the homogenous policies that limited the possibility and wonder that grows from the earth, Dungy employs the various plants, herbs, vegetables, and flowers she grows in her garden as metaphor and treatise for how homogeneity threatens the future of our planet, and why cultivating diverse and intersectional language in our national discourse about the environment is the best means of protecting it.

Definitive and singular, Soil functions at the nexus of nature writing, environmental justice, and prose to encourage you to recognize the relationship between the peoples of the African diaspora and the land on which they live, and to understand that wherever soil rests beneath their feet is home.

WORKSHOP—FIGS FOR THE HOME GARDEN
BIRDSONG ORCHARDS

Figs are a fantastic addition to any home garden in our temperate climate. Figs are easy to grow, easy to harvest, and as I will demonstrate in this workshop, very easy to propagate as well. Of all the fruit we grow at Birdsong Orchards, figs have consistently been at the top of our list for productivity and sheer flavor delight.

Please join me on Saturday, February 10th, from 10 am - 12 pm for a dedicated fig workshop. All participants will go home with a collection of fig cuttings and all the knowledge you need to grow them successfully.

We will cover the history of figs, varieties suitable for the California coast, pruning new, young and mature trees, as well as fig pests and problems. Walking through the orchard, we will look at how different varieties mature and develop. Finally, we will conduct a hands on workshop with fig cuttings, sending each participant home with fig starts propagated with a variety of methods.

Suitable for ages 16 and up. The location is at our farm: 613 Lakeview Rd, Watsonville, CA 95076.

Please wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes, comfortable clothing and bring a water bottle. We will walk 1-2 miles total on a gentle slope.

'We founded Birdsong Orchards in 2013 to turn an old 8 acre fallow farm back into production. This land was initially cultivated as an apple and dairy farm in the 1950s-60s. The original farm closed in the 1980s, and the land laid empty until we moved in.

We bought the property to plant a permanent fruit tree orchard to the highest standards of regenerative and natural farming. We have also planted a smaller plot of perennial flowers for florists, you-pick customers and the pollinators. We grow all of our crops through deeply sustainable practices to enrich and nurture the holistic health of

this land. Our goal is to encourage biodiversity and environmental balance while growing produce of the highest quality and taste.

Why do we do it?

To show that agriculture and nature can co-exist in harmony

To prove that small scale organic farming can be viable

To provide hope in the face of climate crisis

To create a template for local farming in uncertain times

After over 40 cumulative years designing software, we are now turning some of our time and energy into designing a sustainable farm. Moving from pixels to atoms is a deeply rewarding and welcome switch. Because we like to play with our food, we are planting and experimenting with hundreds of different species and varieties of tree fruits. We have a deep respect for the land, and are looking for ways to nurture the earth during this time of climate change while exploring new crops and cultivars for our area."


