Scholarship Awards Night!

We are very pleased to announce that, thanks to the persistent efforts of Bill Patterson and Marcia Meyer, and the increased generosity of our members, we will be awarding a total of FOUR scholarships of \$500 each at our meeting to deserving college and high school students who excel in horticulture studies.

Marcia will introduce our two high school recipients at the meeting. She worked closely with the Farm Bureau who selected these students. One attends Costanoa High School (a charter school in Santa Cruz) and one attends Watsonville High School. Their teachers have also asked to attend to briefly tell us a little about their classes and students. These

scholarships are an amazing way to support young people who work hard and have great ambitions, most of whom who will continue studies at Cabrillo College.

Bill will introduce our Cabrillo Horticulture students, Kristin Fleming and Jamie Bossioi, in recognition of their excellence academically and in plant production. They will share their learning experiences and they and their teachers will be available for personal conversations at our break time. Bill has taken many of the Cabrillo Horticulture classes himself, and hopes that their stories may inspire some of you to enroll in classes.

We love supporting the next generation who will be influencing and practicing sustainable horticulture and related fields. Two of our recurring awards are in memory of Virginia Saso and Pat Williams; one is in the name of Ernie Wasson. The fourth award this year was made possible by extra donations during our membership sign-up by members like you, many in memory of our dear departed Patty Connole.

April meeting. In 1967, 10-yearold Ken read <u>The Secret</u>
<u>Garden</u> by Frances Burnett. It
took him a whole summer to
read, but it inspired him to see
gardening as a celebration of
our coexistence with nature. In
1985, he took on an
apprenticeship at the UCSC
Farm & Garden, and there he
discovered his passion. He

didn't want to do anything else but garden. He founded bicycle-powered Terra Nova Ecological Landscaping in 1988, and has dedicated his life to caring for the environment and community through sustainable landscaping.

Besides landscaping, Ken has also been involved in bringing a program called Monterey Bay Friendly Landscaping to Santa Cruz. The program, which is funded by the State Water Resources Control Board, promotes conservation of our watershed through rainwater harvest, grey water reuse, energy saving, and water use reduction. He also teaches a permaculture class at Cabrillo College.

Ken believes that beautiful landscapes can be made without the use of gas powered equipment and toxic chemicals that many other landscaping businesses use today. He believes in the permaculture ethic "Care for the Earth" and the principle "Produce No Waste," and applies them to his business. The Santa Cruz Bonsai Kai is a local club devoted to promoting and teaching bonsai as an art form. The beautifully exhibited trees may be seen from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. both days and are the product of many years of horticultural development and artistic creativity. A bonsai is actually a living sculpture and an art form that dates back at least 3000 years.

The highlight of the show will be at 2:00 p.m. each day, when Bonsai Masters, Eric Schrader (Demonstrator for Saturday), and Sensei Katsumi Kinoshita (Demonstrator for Sunday) will demonstrate the techniques of creating an artistic tree from common nursery stock. The newly created bonsai tree will then be offered in a raffle drawing along with other trees and items donated by club members. These trees have been cared for, designed, wired, and potted in bonsai pots so individuals winning the tree/s can begin enjoying this art form immediately. Other activities: Watsonville Taiko performance, Saturday 11 a.m. and Carolyn Fitz, calligraphy and ink painting artist, will demonstrate Sumi-e Japanese Ink Painting on Saturday only at 12:30pm; Santa Cruz Todo Kai martial arts performance, Sunday 11 a.m. Origami crane demonstrations on both days at 1:00pm

Last month NIkolara Jansons told us about her first 20 years as a member of The Gardeners' Club. She has decided to contribute her thoughts occasionally to our newsletter. This month, what she has to say stimulates me to take a more deliberate approach to gardening:

"I encourage members to become experts. An expert? Doesn't that sound intimidating? But remember all experts were once novices. So pick a passion of yours: a particular grouping of plans (annuals, succulents, water plants etc.) or a particular genus or some gardening method and learn all you can about it. Do web searches, check out library books, visit arboretum libraries, look for specialized club

meetings, ask other gardeners what they know. Challenge yourself. Say your passion is roses: have you ever grow them from seed? Or taken cuttings? Have you tried grafting them? Pruning them differently? Growing them in less optimal conditions, such as shade or in containers? Have you given a lecture at the Gardeners' Club or written

an article for our newsletter about your expertise?

We're already an amazing group of passionate gardeners, let's share our knowledge and enthusiasms as we learn more."


Slug Control: Get a head-start before they take over!

If your garden is small, remove slugs by hand. Hunting them by flashlight after sundown can be an entertaining activity, for you and your neighbors. If you get slug slime on your hands, wash it off using white vinegar and warm water.

- Beer: You can trap slugs and snails by placing beer (any brand will do, they're not picky) in shallow pans or plastic food containers (such as vogurt or margarine tubs). Cut a few entrance holes around the rim, then fill halfway with beer, put the lid on top to keep out rain, and bury the trap so the entrances are at ground level. Place several containers throughout the garden near damaged plants. Beer is effective for about 3 days before it loses attractiveness to slugs and
- Natural Predators: Encourage slug/snail predators such as beetles, chickens, and ducks.
- Barriers: Diatomaceous earth, crushed egg shells, and copper tape can make effective barriers. If damage is severe bait can be extremely effective.
- **Iron phosphate** is the active ingredient in products like Sluggo. It is not attractive to wildlife, pets, or children and it breaks down into iron and phosphorous which enrich your soil. It is OMRI listed so is safe for organic gardening.

or far less than they did before. think that's what a garden's for.



In partnership with the California Native Plant Society (CNPS), the Arboretum's Spring 2016 Plant Sale will offer quality, regionally-friendly plants from both groups at great prices. The Eucalyptus Grove is located on High Street at the intersection with Western Drive. If you want to get in early and are not a member, memberships for both organizations will be available at the gate on the day of the sale. Knowledgeable Arboretum staff and gardening experts will be on hand to assist customers with their plant selections, to answer questions about the plants and offer advice to ensure they thrive.

The sale offers colorful, water-wise succulents and cacti, small trees, and plentiful other plants from Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and California. Many of the featured plants attract birds, particularly hummingbirds, and most of these can't be found at local nurseries or elsewhere in the stateFood and beverages can be purchased as well.

Time to Mulch! Which one?

Straw is a good choice to mulch a vegetable garden because as it breaks down it will add nitrogen to the soil.
Straw is lightweight and easy

to rake, and stays put. Pine needles also will help create the acid-rich soil which veggies and berries like. For paths, stone, rock, and decomposed granite mulches make effective mulches for high-traffic because they are more stable. For flower beds, wood chips or bark will stay in place, break down slowly and create a unifying backdrop. Beneath trees, spreading large wood chips around a trunk can have a protective effect – just don't mulch right up to the trunk.

Feng Shui Landscape Design- Saturday, April 1, 10 am - 4 pm


