A Presentation by Nicky Hughes

For the last ten years Nicky Hughes has run her own small nursery in Soquel – Gold Rush Nursery – which specializes in water-wise plants and plants that attract birds, butterflies and beneficial insects. For the last two years, she has also been teaching in the Horticulture Department at Cabrillo College where she teach classes in Plant Propagation, California Natives and Fall and Spring Plant Materials and Design.

Nicky's talk will be a two-topic one. She'll be talking about tissue culture

and micropropagation and how these relatively new techniques are now dominating the world of propagation. And, iIn the light of all last year's wildfires in California, she'll also be talking about plants that are fire-followers and safe and sane methods of germinating seeds of these species at home.



Join Chadwick Garden manager Orin Martin for a special workshop about garden bed preparation, featuring the classic double digging technique that Alan Chadwick introduced at the Student Garden Project (now the Chadwick Garden) more than 50 years ago.

Learn when and how to create and maintain garden beds, incorporate compost, and maintain your beds through the years with cover crops and careful cultivation practices. The workshop will also review "intensive" planting techniques, including intercropping, to maximize production in your garden beds.

LOTS TO DO IN MARCH!

Plant camellias and azaleas. Because they are now in full bloom, you can see the exact colors of their flowers, so it is a good time to shop and plant. Amend the soil with organic matter, and plant so the top of the root ball is an inch higher than the surrounding ground

Pest alert. Carefully guard tender new plantings from snails and slugs, which become more active as the weather warms. Don't wait a day to put down bait or deterrents. Be ready for rose slugs (actually the larvae of sawflies), which pepper rose leaves with tiny holes. Caught early in the year, they are easily controlled with a spray of light horticultural oil (nonpoisonous) applied every two weeks.

You can plant beet, cabbage, carrot, corn, endive, kale, lettuce, greens, New Zealand spinach, onion, pea, potato, radish, sunflower and Swiss chard. In a normal March, you could put out some "Early Girl" tomatoes with "Wall-of-Water" protectors, but this year it is hard to predict when this cold spell will end!

Side-dress the garlic you planted in fall with compost and soil amendments high in nitrogen. Pinch your chrysanthemums now for better, bushier blooms later. Feed your roses: try an organic blend of cottonseed meal, alfalfa meals and composted manure.
