May is National Salad Month!





And, because Cinco de Mayo falls during National Salad Month, we can celebrate both with the following salad.



Serves 6-8 as a side or taco topping Recipe by the Nanuck Chef, inspired by The Cookin Canuck.

INGREDIENTS

2 large carrots 1 bunch radishes (about 1 lb or 12 radishes) Cilantro (small bunch) 1/2 a jalapeño (optional)Juice of 2 limes1 tsp.Ground cumin2 TBSP Olive oil2 tsp.Honey or agave nectarSalt

INSTRUCTIONS

Wash veggies and cilantro. Peel the carrots (Optional). Cut off ends of carrots. Trim both sides of radishes. Cut the jalapeño in half and remove the seeds.

Set up food processor with the shredder attachment. Push the carrots and radishes through the food processor with the plastic guard.

Pour the shredded carrots and radishes into mixing bowl.

Pick cilantro leaves off the stems of a small bunch. With your hands, tear the leaves into small pieces. Add to the shredded carrots.

In a small bowl, add honey, cumin, olive oil, a pinch of salt and lime juice. Measure 2 tsp honey and pour into the small bowl. Whisk the dressing. Pour the dressing into the mixing bowl with the veggies, and toss.


Serve by itself, as a side, or as a taco or tostado topping.

May Gardening Tasks

Plant more lettuce, spinach, arugula and peas while the soil is still cool enough.

Divide phlox, coreopsis, coral bells. Pinch back Sedum Autumn Joy, asters and mums. Take cuttings for

new plants from azaleas, carnations, chrysanthemums, geraniums and succulents.

Beef up borders with perennials before the soil warms too much. Cooler soil encourages healthy roots.

Thin leafy greens so plants have plenty of room about two inches apart is just right.

Loosen roots of annuals crammed into cell packs so they spread out and grow strong.

Check your irrigation system. Give it a test run, look for leaks and make repairs as needed. If you are using a drip systems and plants are getting bigger, you may need to add another drip emitter to make sure both sides of the roots get water. Check your timer, if you have one, and try to make your irrigation timing less frequent, but longer so the water can get deep. Watch for runoff and, if needed, alter your program to include breaks between runs; this will allow the soil time to absorb the water.

Sow seeds of corn, squash, carrots and cucumbers. Sow bush beans 2 inches apart. Pole beans need a foot between plants – and a trellis to climb

Snip off faded daffodil flowers. But remember to let the foliage stay to feed the bulb.

Feel the heat. It's the "safe planting date" for heat-lovers like eggplants and petunias. And, it is tomato time! Support or cage tomato plants early.

Loosen or remove stakes from trees planted in winter.

Deadhead and groom geraniums for longer flowering.

Nature doesn't encourage bare soil and neither should we. For shrubs, trees and ground covers, use at least 1" of compost and 3" of shredded native tree trimmings or shredded hardwood bark. Mulch vegetable gardens with 8" of partially completed compost or straw. Mulch preserves moisture, eliminates weeds and keeps the soil surface cooler which benefits earthworms, microorganisms and plant roots.

Thin fruit on fruit trees as needed (use the width of your closed fist as a rough guide). Before apples, Asian pears, nectarines, and peaches reach an inch in diameter, gently twist off enough fruit to allow 4 to 6 inches between

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remaining fruit.

If you did not fertilize last month, fertilize roses, citrus, trees, shrubs. Fertilize azaleas, camelias, and rhododendrons when they finish blooming.

Prune rhododendrons after flowering. Pinch out the old buds and shape by pruning away as much as one-third of the plant . Do it promptly before the plant creates next year's flowering buds.

Plant out summer bulbs such as callas, cannas, dahlias, gladiolus, lilies, tigredia and tuberous begonias.
