If you have bulbs you'd like to share with others, bring them, too.

Saving Dahlia Seeds

Every fall I gather thousands of seeds from my dahlias, and each one is a surprise waiting to happen. Some will sprout into ordinary plants, while others may reveal flower forms and colors I've never seen before in my own crosses. But those little seeds are fragile, and how you store them makes all the difference between a thriving seedling and a handful of duds.e

Seeds begin aging as soon as they ripen. Warmth, light, and moisture speed that process. The good news: with proper care, dahlia seeds can stay viable for years.

Cool temperatures are the biggest factor. Seeds kept around 40 °F (4 °C) in a refrigerator retain germination power much longer than those left at room temperature. Combine that with dryness—an airtight container plus a packet of silica gel—and you've solved most of the problem.


Light matters too. Even brief exposure can nudge seeds toward decline, which is why I use opaque jars or containers. And before they go into storage, seeds must be fully dry. I let them air-dry for a week or so, then label each batch clearly with variety, date, and notes before sealing them away.

Handled this way, dahlia seeds can germinate reliably for three to five years. That's enough time to plan crosses, keep a "seed bank" of promising lines, and always have fresh surprises waiting for the next season. One study even tracked the viability of dahlia seeds that had been in storage for 16 years!






